1. **MERE CHRISTIANITY** (C.S. Lewis) — Because of the depth and meaning of faith it conveyed to me.
2. **HOW CHRISTIANITY CHANGED THE WORLD** (Alvin J. Schmidt) — It brought the “old” world into the “new” world for me...message, nothing new under the sun.
3. **HOW NOW SHALL WE LIVE?** (Chuck Colson) — Weighty, insightful,

full of grace.

4. **1776** (David McCullough) — Most powerful history book I ever read about America.
5. **DAVID AND GOLIATH** (Malcolm Gladwell) — Amazingly insightful about human behavior...also in the writing of the book Malcolm came back to faith.
6. **THE BOYS IN THE BOAT: Nine Americans and Their Epic Quest For Gold at the 1936 Olympics** (Daniel James Brown) — I identified with the struggles of these boys, and I found myself weeping for them.
7. **UNBROKEN: A WWII Story of Survival, Resilience and Redemption** (Laura Hillenbrand) — This guy was super human ... wow!

8. **LONE SURVIVOR: The Eyewitness Account of Operation Redwing and The Lost Heroes of Seal Team 10** (Marcus Luttrell) — provides a view into special forces and what they face. The man in me wants to be one. (Warning: bad language)

9. **INSTANT REPLAY: The Green Bay Packers Diary of Jerry Kramer** — The very first book I ever read. I think I was in fourth grade. I loved football even then.

10. **THE ALCHEMIST** (Paulo Coelho) — Liked the adventure of the story and the deeper meaning it holds.
