Almost nine in 10 practicing Christians (88%) say that generosity is either *extremely* or *very* important to them, according to a Barna study commissioned by **Thrivent**. And this—only 13% of millennials give money on a frequent basis.

TECH UPDATE FROM JIM SANDERS

"Technically, What Can I Say?"

We often get questions from ministries who are new to Christian radio asking, "What can I say on the air?" Essentially, they want to know the permissible boundaries of:

- Mentioning their website
- Including their toll-free number or mailing address
- Asking for donations or financial support
- Offering a "premium" in response to their inquiry

There's a range of what stations deem acceptable. However, there are also universal principles which apply to both short features (typically 1:00) PSAs as well as long-form programs.

Whenever a program (short or long-form) is airing at no charge to the ministry (commercial or non-commercial license), there are some factors to consider:

- 1. You're receiving free air time. The station is giving you their most valuable asset in exchange for your programming. So make sure you have the best content available. That works to your, and the station's, benefit.
- 2. Most non-commercially licensed stations raise support directly from their audience. This means if you raise money on the air, you're competing with their audience for discretionary giving.
- 3. Commercial stations airing your program at no cost to you are giving up potential revenue. Make sure they know how grateful you are for that fact!

While there are FCC-mandated guidelines for non-commercial stations related to "commercial" speech, there are five variables which are all-important anytime the station is providing airtime at no charge. They are: **Frequency, Length, Intensity, Specificity** and **Personality**. The sum of these variables is what makes any message heard on air acceptable or not. Since you're in partnership with the station, we'd recommend you pay careful attention to each of these factors individually as well as the sum of the parts:

Frequency — How often is an offer heard on air? Once per week? Every day? Three times in the body of the program? If a PSA mentions a financial need once a quarter, that's probably acceptable. Every day is probably too often.

Intensity — How "in your face" is a request for support? Is it in response to a free offer or simply asking for support? How "demanding" is the request? Is it altruistic or guilt-inducing?

Length — How much time is spent asking? What percentage of the feature is spent talking about the financial need? The briefer the better.

Specificity — Are you asking for a specific dollar figure ("your gift of \$25") or just generally "a gift of any amount" or even more generically, "your support."

Personality — Who is asking? Any ministry headed by someone who's well-loved and winsome will be better received than a generic announcer.

Here's the point: Be sensitive to stations' need to meet FCC guidelines, but more importantly, be respectful of their gift of airtime to your ministry. PSAs are often not much more than an image campaign. See it as such without attention to the number of people who went to your website.

And when it comes to stations, maybe most importantly, don't forget to thank them for the gift of their time to your ministry!



MY TOP TEN BOOKS

Jon Wallace

His hero celebrates a birthday this month (hats off to Mr. Lincoln!)—and he does as well—so it's the perfect time to share recommendations from our good friend **Jon Wallace**. Part of the Azusa Pacific University community for more than 40 years, Jon led as president for nearly two decades. I heard Jon's wisdom in many settings beyond the boardroom, especially in Chapel and in the classroom (a Senior Seminar in Business Ethics each Fall). He and wife, Gail (pictured), enjoy sharing that wisdom now with their eight beautiful grandchildren. — *Peggy Campbell*

1 Life Together (Dietrich Bonhoeffer) | Insightful and grounded understanding of Christian community crafted by Bonhoeffer while he was living in an underground seminary during Nazi leadership in Germany. This book has shaped how I think about my own accountability to community.

2 A Long Obedience in the Same Direction: Discipleship in an Instant Society (Eugene Peterson) | Peterson's book brings clarity to the journey of discipleship as he unpacks the Psalms of Assent. I have used this book for many years as an introduction to the discipleship process with college students.

3 Telling the Truth: The Gospels as Tragedy, Comedy, and Fairy Tale (Frederick Buechner) This small hardback book was a constant companion for me in the late 1970's and early 1980's when backpacking and peak climbing in the Sierra Nevada Mountains. My fellow hikers/climbers passed it around the campfire and read key passages on distant mountaintops.

4 Out of Solitude: Three Meditations on the Christian Life (Henri J. M. Nouwen)

Nouwen's books fill a shelf in my office. As a certified introvert, I find a kind of courage from Nouwen's reflections on three moments in the life of Christ. This is another favorite that is often tucked into my

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backpack when heading into the backcountry.

5 Team of Rivals: The Political Genius of Abraham Lincoln (Doris Kearns Goodwin) | In my opinion one of the best books on Lincoln's leadership and character. Kearns Goodwin is perhaps one of America's greatest living historians. In this book she recounts how Lincoln built his cabinet with brilliant and courageous men that had previously been political rivals.

6 Leadership Prayers (Richard Kriegbaum) | Dr. Kriegbaum is a former Christian University president with a deep understanding of the importance of prayer in the life of a leader. Divided into 30 prayers focused on specific areas where leaders face challenges, this is one of my go-to resources for a dose of daily inspiration and meditation on critical decisions I'm facing.

Z God Is No Fool: Ninety-Nine Acts of Communication with God (Lois A. Cheney) | I discovered this book many years ago when I first began working with college age students. Cheney's words ring true with those looking for insight without banalities, and truth that reaches across the generations.

8 You Gotta Keep Dancin' (Tim Hansel) | I wandered the backcountry with Tim, a gifted teacher of things both physical and spiritual. He helped to found the Walkabout wilderness program at Azusa Pacific, and in so doing opened the door for many college students to experience the wonder of authentic Christian community. This book was written after a terrible climbing accident left him with permanent and nearly disabling pain.

9 How Now Shall We Live? (Charles Colson and Nancy Pearcey) | Early in my tenure as the president at Azusa Pacific I gave this book to all of our employees. Colson and Pearcey clearly articulate a compelling Christian world view and provide a roadmap for Christ followers in light of these truths. I have pointed others to this resource when asking the questions: who am I, what is my purpose, what is truth?

10 My First Summer in the Sierra (John Muir) | In 1869 John Muir, the great naturalist, spent his first summer in the Sierra. This book comes from the journal he kept that summer. When first published in 1911 it proved to be a primary driver in helping the American people embrace the preservation of our great outdoors including treasures such as Yosemite and Sequoia National Park. A ragged copy has accompanied me on a number of Yosemite backcountry trips.

What's one book everyone should read?



One of the most powerful books that I have read recently is *Not a Fan* by Kyle Idleman. This book gives believers a powerful reminder to be fully engaged in living out our faith. Kyle invites us to take a serious and honest look at our relationship with Christ. Jesus wants fully committed followers, not fans sitting on the sidelines.

*There is also a very powerful small group Bible study available to accompany the book!

CS Lewis — *The Great Divorce*. I found this to be a fascinating read regarding our sin nature, heaven, hell and the choices people make.

I make it a point to read A Christmas Carol each Christmas season. Dickens' imagery and vivid descriptions of both physical and emotional landscapes alone make it a great read. Beyond that, it's a tale of bitter loneliness, anger, and sin. The spectres hold a mirror to Scrooge's face and reveal to him what he really is. The connection to Calvin's first use of the Gospel is unmistakable. The final result is a complete transformation from inside out. Scrooge is pursued by Spirits which he initially resists and is regenerated into a completely new creation by virtue of that pursuit. There's a second remarkable comparison to the Christian experience. Finally, Dickens puts the Gospel in the mouth of a child, of course. Tiny Tim says that, while in church, he hoped that he reminded people of the One who makes the lame walk and the blind see. It's a compact presentation of the Gospel in the form of a great Christmas story.
